
Social Media





Grade 5/6: Week 2

Another great but busy week of learning in Grade 5/6. Last Friday afternoon we had our first Grade 5/6 assembly where we touched on some important reminders around mobile phones and devices at school, correct school uniforms and ensuring students are not wearing jewellery or make-up to school. Grade 3/4 News

ANZAC Day

With ANZAC day on Thursday, Week 2 has gone by very quickly. Mrs McEwan's class made ANZAC biscuits with her class on Monday, which left the office smelling delicious. Classes also read some different ANZAC picture stories books, read ANZAC day poetry and completed some ANZAC day craft as we remembered why the 25th of April is a day of importance.

Reading continued to explore the types of vocabulary used by an author when describing a setting. It has been fantastic to see students building on their vocabulary during reading and transferring their new knowledge into their writing.

Classes are using picture stimulus from the Amazon rainforest to plan and begin drafting a narrative story using the pictures provided. We can't wait for these stories to be completed so we can share them with families.

Math's continues with our unit on addition and subtraction. We are aiming for students to build on their knowledge of the relationship between these two operations to extend their abilities to complete these tasks with efficient mental strategies. Games with dice and playing cards where students are addition or

subtracting different numbers is a

subtracting different numbers is a great way that you at home can continue developing these strategies with your child. These games can be adapted to suit different skills as they can include multiplication, decimal numbers or larger place value numbers)

STEM- Mrs McEwan has organised a very exciting opportunity for 30 students across grades 3-6 to be included in upcoming excursion on Tuesday the 30th of April. The Royal Botanic Gardens Victoria (RBGV) have partnered with the Department of Education and Training and Bendigo Botanic Gardens to offer a Free STEM excursion program. Students will learn how nature can be used for design inspiration and problem-solving through STEM and biomimicry. Students will observe the tried and tested biological strategies and patterns of nature and design their own nature-inspired STEM ideas for a healthier planet. This is a wonderful opportunity for our students and school to take part in this program.

Home Reading- Our 3/4 cohort is going to be having a huge home reading push! We would like to see every child reading at home everyday. The reading is required to be recorded in the school diary and SIGNED by a parent. As students progress through the classes home reading can tend to drop off, however it is critical that parents are involved and encouraging their children to be engaged in the skill of reading.

- -Asking questions before, during and after are important comprehension questions.
- -Summarising the texts.
- -Reading aloud using expression.
- Reading fluently.
- -Identifying genre

Are just some of the follow up questions families can ask their child about the text they are reading.

We know home life can be busy so we appreciate your support with this task as readies a life skill.

Grade 1/2 News

Inquiry - This week we have continued to look at our integrated topic on "My Community" and focusing on our own family.

Prep News

Even though it has been a short week we packed a lot of learning in anyway! Students have settled into Term Two incredibly well.





For math's last week we practiced hefting and using balance scales.

This week in the Prep rooms:

Phonics – students have learnt another two letter sounds this week. These include Oo and Dd. They have continued blending letter sounds and making CVC words.

Reading – students have been exposed to information texts about animals. They have been learning about the difference between vertebrae and in-vertebrae animals, as well as reading texts about ANZAC Day.

Writing – we have continued practicing letter formation and writing short sentences using CVC words.

Math's – students have been learning how important it is to use their fingers in math's. They learnt about the number 7, including tally marks, numbers before and after and what it looks like on a tens frame. They used informal tools to measure different objects in the room.
